PREREQUISITES

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

At the end of the course, the student will be able to describe some concepts related to entering the workforce, professional organization, and delve into certain obstetric-gynecological topics with particular attention to birth physiology and obstetrics emergencies/urgencies.

Knowledge and Understanding

- Describe the organization of the maternal-infant department and the roles of the obstetric leadership and coordination.

- Describe the main obstetric emergencies/urgencies and the procedures to implement for their prompt resolution.

The ability to respond appropriately and precisely to the required task, demonstrating sufficient mastery of scientific language, will be evaluated. The written paper will be evaluated as follows:
